*Substance Abuse and the Family:
An Overview of Theory and Intervention*

Research consistently shows that intervening with the family is one of the most effective approaches to treatment of substance abuse in both adolescents and adults. This workshop will present an overview of family systems interventions with families affected by substance abuse.

Designed for the substance abuse counselor with minimal exposure to family systems work, it will explore the major theories and interventions currently considered best practice.

The workshop will include discussion of such topics as gender, the relationship of substance abuse and violence, trauma, co-occurring disorder treatment, and approaches to working with substance abusing adolescents. Participants will come away with an understanding of ways to integrate family work with their current preferred practices in counseling substance abusers.

Claudia Bepko is a nationally known author and trainer on the integration of family systems and substance abuse work. Since publishing her first book, *The Responsibility Trap*, in 1985, she has written and lectured widely on various topics related to substance abuse treatment. A family therapist in clinical practice for over 20 years, she is currently the Director of Substance Abuse Services for Sweetser, the largest behavioral health organization in Maine.

*The Neurobiology of Addiction: So What—
Why Clinicians Need to Know*

The addiction process significantly impacts the brain and how clients function. Drug use during adolescence can seriously impair and compromise brain development and future functioning. Understanding the neurobiology of addiction and compromised brain development will enable clinicians to tailor their treatment protocols so that clients can be more successful.

Research has revealed how drugs of abuse can cause addiction and why some persons are more vulnerable than others to the process of addiction. You will learn the unique and common CNS (central nervous system) features of the various groups of drugs of abuse. An overview of where treatment currently is and how research can help us to improve our therapies in the future will be presented.

When Gambling is More than a Game

Some form of gambling is now legal in 48 states and while most Americans enjoy gambling as a social activity, a growing number are experiencing more harmful effects. Just as some people may abuse or become addicted to drugs or alcohol, a percentage of gamblers find they are unable to limit their behavior to the simple fun of the game.

The purpose of this workshop is to educate participants about gambling as a social and community health issue, and to provide a basic understanding of the prevalence and impact of problem gambling and the resources available to address this growing mental health concern. Recommended for any professional with a general interest in problem gambling prevention, education and treatment.

Targeted outcomes from the plan can then be assessed with process and outcome evaluation methods.

The Dark Night: Managing the sleep problems and nightmares of clients in early recovery

David Skibbins, Ph.D.

Nightmares, restless sleep, and disturbing dreams of drinking and using drugs haunt the nights of clients in early stages of addiction treatment. Like every other part of the client's life, they too need to be addressed.

In this workshop we will explore the physiological, psychological, and deeply personal disturbances that happen during the night for clients in the early stages of addiction treatment. Tools will be presented for helping your clients understand and manage their fitful sleep patterns. Non-psychodynamic techniques will be shared for working with nightmares, and disturbing dream content. Particular focus will be placed on how the EAP professional or clinical worker can utilize dreams about drinking or using drugs to support the recovery process.

This presentation will explore those factors in the health professions and those who enter the profession that contribute to the disease of addiction. Problem Gambling – Counseling & Treatment Strategies

The treatment of problem gambling is grounded in the same basic theories and techniques as other addictive disorders. Problem gamblers, however, often present for treatment with unique and complex issues that must be appropriately addressed in order to facilitate long-term recovery.

This workshop will focus on the development and application of specific counseling and treatment strategies to address the challenging personal concerns of problem gamblers and their families.

The workshop is recommended for professionals who have some prior experience or knowledge in the diagnosis and treatment of problem gambling; particularly those who are seeking to become a Certified Problem Gambling Counselor in Nevada.

Community Trials to Reduce High Risk Drinking

Andrew Treno, Ph.D.

This workshop presents an introduction to the implementation and evaluation of environmentally-based interventions designed to reduce alcohol use and related problems. It begins with a discussion of the history of such interventions, how they differ from more traditional approaches and how they have been evaluated.

Topics covered include the development of logic models, the relationship between logic models and intervention design, and how specific evaluation tools may be used to test intervention design and efficacy/effectiveness. Issues of cost, leveraging existing resources, and tailoring general strategies to local conditions and priorities will be addressed.

The workshop will conclude with participants developing a preliminary plan for the implementation of an environmentally-based program along with a project evaluation design.

Environmental management strategies to reducing high risk drinking (with an emphasis on the college population) including: developing and working with a campus task force, campus/community coalition and state substance abuse prevention partners to reduce alcohol availability and promotion, ways to increase/enhance enforcement, positive changes to campus policies, and correcting misperceptions about campus use through social norms marketing.

Social norms theory and practice and how to conduct a social norms marketing campaign, including: survey development, message development, choosing appropriate venues to publish misperception correction information, design, how to work with the media, market testing strategies - focus groups and interview techniques.
