Special Prevention Series

Seven Steps to Prevention Program Planning

Nov - Mar



This will be a special series of three two-day classes, held in several locations. The series will be conducted from November 2003 to March 2004 in Reno, Las Vegas and other locations.

CSAP's Western CAPT's Seven Step Process for Building a Successful Prevention Program is based on research conducted by the Center for Substance Abuse Prevention (CSAP), the National Institute of Drug Abuse (NIDA), Developmental Research and Programs (DRP) (now Channing Bete Company, Inc.), the National Center for the Advancement of Prevention (NCAP), and the Northwest Professional Consortium.

This planning model assists prevention specialists in mobilizing their community and assessing community readiness, identifying substance abuse prevention needs, prioritizing risk and protective factors, conducting a resource assessment, selecting a focus population, selecting best practices, and evaluating their efforts. The Seven Step planning process is based on the risk and protective factor framework of prevention and can be used in conjunction with the CTC process.

Online Basics

All online courses will run for four weeks. In order to take an online course, participants need an e-mail address, access to and familiarity with the Internet and the World Wide Web.

The course is conducted entirely on the Internet. Homework is submitted by e-mail.

Registration and Course Fees

Participants will register for an online course by completing the workshop registration form at the end of this catalog. The cost for an online course is \$40.00. There are no special rates for the online courses. Registrants must pay the course fee before starting the course.

- ◆ access to the Internet

How it works

After registering for the course, an e-mail confirmation will be sent to each individual just prior to the first week of the course. The confirmation details the dates of the course, access to the course, and the e-mail addresses of the course instructor and CASAT's

webmaster. A password is not needed to access CASAT online courses.

After the course begins, participants will receive a pre-evaluation/data collection form in the mail. This form must be completed and returned to the CASAT office by the end of the first week of the course. During the fourth (last) week of the course a post-evaluation form will be sent to all participants. Course certificates will not be mailed until the participant returns both pre- and post-evaluations.

Each week, the instructor for the course will post reading and homework assignments for the participants. Homework will be submitted to the instructor by e-mail. The instructor will read participants' homework assignments, make comments, answer questions, and return homework to the participants by e-mail. Questions for instructors can be sent to an electronic message board or the instructor's e-mail.

Coursework

Participants in online courses can expect approximately one hour of reading and one hour of homework (answering essay type questions) per week for four weeks. Some instructors may have participants visit certain Web sites as part of homework assignments. All homework assignments must be completed in order for the participant to earn contact hours. Homework assignments must be completed on a weekly basis. Pre- and post-tests will be administered with each online course.

Contact Hours

Each online course will be worth 8 contact hours. *Completed and submitted homework assignments are the mechanisms used to grant contact hours.* CASAT will issue certificates to participants who complete and submit all homework assignments. Participants who complete some but not all homework assignments will not be issued a certificate or given a reduced number of contact hours (CEHs). Participants who do not complete homework assignments will not be given a refund.

Nevada Alcohol and Drug Abuse Counselor Requirements

Licensed/Certified Counselors	Nevada Administrative Code 641C (NAC 641C.300) requires that all licensed or certified alcohol and drug counselors earn 40 hours of continuing education during a two year period of licensure or certification.
Clinical Supervisors	Licensed counselors who supervise certified interns must attend at least 10 hours of continuing education in counseling supervision, ethics, and Nevada law during the two year certification period. These hours may be included in the required 40 hours of continuing education.
Interns	Registered counselor interns are required to earn 15 hours of training in the first six months, 10 hours during the second six months and 20 hours in each subsequent year.
Record-keeping	Participants who need contact hours for alcohol and drug counseling licensure, certification, or internship must have proof of attendance (certificate of completion) for possible audit by the Nevada Board of Examiners for Alcohol and Drug Abuse Counselors office. Participants are reminded that maintenance of contact hour records, certificates, etc., is the responsibility of the individual and not CASAT or the Board of Examiners.
